# Looking after the elderly horse

More and more horses and ponies are living for longer and becoming geriatrics (defined as aged 20 years and over) due to advancing veterinary medicine and owners become better and better at spotting early signs of disease,



however just because they are classed as geriatric does not mean that they aren't young at heart and have to be retired!

The topic of 'What things should I look out for in my old horse' is something that is often discussed at routine vaccinations. As a horse ages it is important to monitor for certain health problems which are commonly seen in an ageing population;

**Dental Problems** are common and may manifest as difficulty with the bit, reduced appetite, weight loss or headshaking. Six monthly dental checks are recommended for horses over 15 years old (we check teeth free of charge at annual vaccinations).

Low grade lameness is to be expected as osteoarthritis sets in, this is often put down to as 'stiffness'. Most of these conditions can be improved with treatment after the lameness is localised to a particular joint or area.

Older horses (especially ponies) commonly develop **Cushings disease.** The clinical signs can include any of the following: curly coat, recurrent laminitis, a 'pot bellied' appearance, lethargy, recurrent infections, passing more urine and drinking more. This condition can be managed once it has been diagnosed with a blood test.

Liver disease is much less common than other diseases of old age however it can be an organ that we consider in a variety of cases as signs of liver disease can be extremely varied and at times vague. These signs can include depression, reduced appetite and weight loss which can be extremely difficult for us as vets to appreciate as we are only likely to see your horse once or twice a year, therefore you as the person that sees your horse daily are best placed to alert us of any subtle changes.

Other signs can include diarrhoea, colic and increased drinking.

Many older horses struggle to maintain their condition, especially over the winter months. If weight loss is sudden or dramatic we will

investigate to rule out concurrent disease. However often a change in diet is all that's necessary, horses become less efficient at extracting nutrients from their feed as they age. It is important to



maintain fibre content even if the horse is struggling to eat hay or haylage. A hay replacement diet can be created with chaff, sugar beet and soaked pony nuts. We can advise you or put you in touch with a nutritionist if you feel your horse would benefit from a dietary change.

Older horses and ponies struggle more with extremes of weather than their younger friends. However they generally benefit from the low grade excercise that turnout provides and would stiffen up if kept indoors for long periods. Therefore we recommend that they remain turned out with the benefit of good rugs and a field shelter, in all but the most extreme weather conditions.

With modern medicine and treatment options it is possible for many horse and ponies to carry on working well into their twilight years. We have many patients in the practice who are still in regular work in their 20s and 30s!
